As we step into December, the church begins the new Christian year with Advent. Writer Enuma Okoro in Silence and Other Surprising Invitations of Advent says, "Advent is a season to ponder, to listen, to understand that prayer is as much about cultivating stillness and attentiveness as it is about offering our words to God. This listening for God is a difficult business. It requires a willingness to be patient and to be still. It requires disciplining ourselves to consistent times of sitting quietly before God and waiting for God to meet us in that space. When we are still we can better attune ourselves to the thoughts and feelings that well up within.

As we anticipate God made flesh in Christ Jesus, we dare to relinquish control, to harness our empty life-numbing habits, and to forfeit logic and reason because God often acts outside of such boundaries. Advent is a season in which we are reminded that God invites us to listen, dwell, wait, and trust in communion with one another. No one is left to discern God's life-altering activity alone, to hold God's promises alone, or to bear the burden of divine blessings without faithful companions, whether human or angelic."

The stories which light the way to Christmas morn remind us of the silence, and the pondering, and the wondering that captured these characters – from Zechariah and Elizabeth to Mary to Joseph. Might we be caught in stillness, dwelling with reverent expectation with God and one another, as we step into the new year – to prepare our bodies, our minds, our hearts, and spirits to receive the Christ child and take him into the world to see and worship; the Christ with whom we dream big and imagine wildly.

REALLY, WHAT DOES IT MEAN TO YOU? LAY LEADER REFLECTION—PETER BAYLIS

It was Wednesday, November 1, 2023, when I saw the first one of the year. I was driving home from church after choir practice and there it was, a light shining out or better yet standing out in the darkness, a beacon for all to see. A house all decked out with its Christmas greenery. For the holiday lights were strung and lit on the front porch, the windows were lit with candles, and a Christmas tree was displayed prominently in the front bay window. And as the early start of November passed, slowly more and more Christmas and holiday decorations started to appear as we approached Thanksgiving and the Advent season. Seeing decorations so early, sometimes I feel like the Grinch for, "Every Who down in Who-ville, liked Christmas a lot...but the Grinch, who lived just north of Who-ville, did not. The Grinch hated Christmas! The whole Christmas season!" Now while I don't agree with the Grinch's sentiment on Christmas and the Christmas season, I do, however feel at times we tend to push the Christmas season ahead of its time as well as what I usually see immediately after Christmas. Many times, the day after Christmas, I see houses that were previously decorated with merriments of good cheer become bare, plain, and ordinary once again. I usually see the discarded Christmas tree out by the trash along with many boxes that held presents on Christmas morning. Why even a house around the corner from where I live begins this "de-decoration" on Christmas day so that by Christmas evening all is packed away and stored for another year. So, I wonder, what does Christmas mean to myself, what does Christmas mean to you and to others?

To pursue this answer, I started to ask individuals a simple question, "What does Christmas mean to you?" Now when I asked the youngest of the youngest one's downstairs during Sunday School, I expected how they would respond and they did not disappoint. Christmas means Santa. While asking some of the older one's downstairs I was given the answer Santa and presents. Moving up in ages, the focus was on presents, and something to do with a baby, but when asked the baby's name, I was met with blank faces. Continuing up the age ladder, responses revolved on presents, food, family, and a baby being born, sometimes with a name and sometimes without. The Sunday School youth tended to reply with presents and Jesus being born. However, when asked what it means that Jesus was born, well once again I was met with blank faces for the most part. Moving to adults of all ages, the first response usually focused on family followed by celebrating the birth of Christ. Still not quite satisfied with these answers, I pushed for further clarification and a deeper understanding of the meaning of the birth of Christ. It was at this point answers did start to become deeper and more reflective: Emmanuel, God with Us, Savior, and God's son.

Now while all the responses made age-appropriate sense, I was still not satisfied with the answers I received. It was at this point I felt like a judge on Jeopardy, being very meticulous since I was looking for one specific word and I just wasn't hearing it which made me question whether maybe I was amiss in my own response. However, with more pondering and reflection on my part, I knew the word that I wanted to hear was right and appropriate. So, my answer to the question of the meaning of Christmas in one word would be...salvation. Now while many great theologians, students of theology, friends gathered around a table and others have discussed and debated the deeper and a more complex meaning of salvation it basically comes to this: Salvation is the saving of humankind, all of us, from our own sin and its consequences, which includes our death and separation from God, and we are restored to wholeness by Christ's death and resurrection. Salvation is God's grace to us. Stay with me now for I'm not confusing Christmas and Easter,

however, the two are interconnectedly tied together so that they cannot be separated. For by the birth of Jesus, salvation is created, and its fulfillment is in the death and resurrection of Jesus. And all the words in the world can try to explain this in greater detail, however, our words will always fall short. Listen again, for in the birth of Jesus, salvation is created, and its fulfillment is in the death and resurrection of Jesus.

In the music offering this month I present the piece **Salvation is Created** by Pavel Chesnokov composed in 1912. This piece was one of the last sacred works he composed before the Soviet government began to suppress Christianity. Chesnokov never heard his piece performed. In the piece, Salvation is Created, there are two phrases that compose the piece, salvation is created and alleluia, which means, God be praised.

And as the Grinch looked down to Who-ville, he said, "Every Who down in Who-ville, the tall and the small, was singing! Without any presents at all! And the Grinch, with his grinch-feet ice-cold in the snow, stood puzzling and puzzling: How could it be so? It came without ribbons! It came with tags! It came without packages, boxes, or bags! And he puzzled for three hours, till his puzzler was sore. Then the Grinch thought of something he hadn't before! Maybe Christmas, he thought, doesn't come from a store. Maybe Christmas...perhaps...means a little bit more!" Here I can finally agree with the Grinch, however, Christmas means a lot, a lot much more!

And during this Advent and Christmas season, may we to puzzle, and ponder in amazement and in awe the love that God has for each of us in that the birth of the babe lying in the manger, is the birth and gift of our salvation given freely and unearned. This is the Christmas present! And may this Christmas gift live, and flourish, guide and grow within each us always.
