This included **Prayer**, **Fasting**, **and Almsgiving**. This Lent, Asbury UMC is offering these means of grace to all ages, so all might observe a Holy Lent.

PRAYING: 40 DAYS OF PRAYER

You are invited to take a packet with a devotional booklet and prayer cards for five people or households in our church on Sunday, February 11. Please pray for them beginning February 14 and throughout Lent, and send a note or card to them before Easter to let them know you have been praying for them. Persons in the church directory will automatically be placed on cards. If you would like to add others, you may complete a prayer card at the piano in the Great Room where Mona Ray will assist you on Sunday, February 4.

FASTING: A DIFFERENT WAY TO FAST—GROW, PRAY, STUDY WEEKLY GUIDE
Based on the new book, A Different Way to Fast, you will receive weekly ideas as
how to fast beyond food. In our busy world, what a welcome relief it would be to
fast from consuming, from multi-tasking and inattention, from scarcity anxiety, and
more. All ages are invited through the Grow, Pray, Study guide each week to
practice fasting in an alternate way.

ALMSGIVING: LAUNDRY LOVE - LENTEN BOXES COLLECTION

During the Lenten season, individuals/families will pick up a Lenten Box, in which persons can make donations of quarters, dollars, or checks (made out to Asbury UMC with Laundry Love in the memo line) for Laundry Love, a local ministry that enables some of our low income or underserved neighbors to wash up to 4 loads of laundry at the Super Wash & Tan in Delaware, Ohio.

The Lenten Boxes will be collected on March 31. Laundry Love is held at Super Wash & Tan, 256 S. Sandusky St., twice a month (one night and one day). The cost of doing one load of laundry (wash and dry) is approximately \$60.

BEGINNING THE JOURNEY: SUNDAY, FEBRUARY 11 – FOLLOWING WORSHIP

You are invited to Palms and Potluck. Bring a dish or purchase a goodie from the Chocolate Fare to share, as well as a service set for you and your family. Following worship, we will burning last year's palms to make ashes for Ash Wednesday, then we will come together for a meal in the McCoy room. FROM DARKNESS TO LIGHT TO DARKNESS

The other day someone had mentioned to me that I had forgotten or that I somehow totally missed taking down the star banner which is hanging in the Great Room over the balcony railing. Well, I didn't forget for I left the star banner up on purpose. The mention of the star banner does, however, allow me the opportunity to explain why it is still hanging and why it will remain hanging for the Sundays until Ash Wednesday.

During the season of Advent, as we prepare for Christmas, we, churches, tend to dwell and focus on images of darkness and light. The music that is prepared and sung during this time reminds each of us that the light of Christ is on the way and that the darkness that we experience in our lives as we wait for the birth of Jesus is not the end of God's story, but rather a continuation of God's story which started even before the creation of the world. During the Christmas season we hear once again the wonderful reassurance from the Gospel of John, "The light shines in the darkness and the darkness does not overcome it (John 1:5)." From Advent, we move to Christmas and from Christmas we move to the season of Epiphany, a season of light, which continues to Ash Wednesday and the beginning of Lent. It is during Epiphany that we hear the encouraging words from Isaiah, "Rise, shine, for your light has come, and the glory of God has risen upon you (Isaiah 60:1)." And the star banner is a continual reminder of God's light in our lives and in our world. But from the light of Epiphany, we move into the darkness of Lent. For Lent beckons each of us to consider what our true state of existence would be like apart from God. For if our lives are apart from Christ, our lives would be immersed in complete mess and crumble and fall into deeper darkness.

The Good News is that the darkness of Lent is not the end, but rather it is through this darkness and the struggles that we face daily that allow us to emerge into a new understanding of the light and the brightness of the joy of Easter. However, before we can get to Easter we need to look and understand the meaning of Lent.

Lent is a season that stands totally on its own. Advent and the Christmas season have become whitewashed and often diluted due to the commercialism of the season. The Christmas season is so intertwined with elements away from the church that one can easily be distracted and lost from its true meaning and significance in our lives. Lent, however, has been left alone from the outside influences of secular society. Lent is heavy and Lent is serious. Lent is not a time of joyful singing and merriment. Lent is a time of reflection and critical deep self-examination. It is a time for intentional contemplation of what we believe and what we stand for as children of God. And just as Jesus was in the wilderness and tested for 40 days after his baptism, Lent enables each of us the opportunity to search inwards and emerge in 40 days with a renewed understanding of the significance of Jesus' sacrifice for us and a renewed trust in God's sovereignty in the light of the greatest event that the universe as ever known: Easter.

The central theme of Lent is to help us adopt the time to remember the passion, death, and resurrection of Jesus. Lent becomes a necessary time of reflection, of prayer, of penance, of charity giving, and a time to repent from our sins and help us to deny our super inflated egos, "For if we say we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us, but if we confess our sins, God who is steadfast and just, will forgive our sins and cleanse us from all unrighteousness (1 John 1:1-8)."

Lent is the season of the year which calls us back to simple living. A time of purposeful and deep prayer to grow closer and more intimate with our Creator and Savior. Lent challenges each of us and provides us the opportunity to intentionally look inward, to search and see who we truly are without false pretense or self-fabrication. Our inward journey begins on Ash Wednesday with a simple action, yet a deep and profound statement, in the receiving of ashes. For by receiving these ashes we acknowledge our mortality, we repent of our sins, and we express our desire to return to our loving God. Ashes that acknowledge that all life as a precious gift from God as we turn to walk with Jesus daily. Lent makes possible for us to make resolutions and to commit to changing our lives over the next forty days, and not just forty days, but beyond, so that we might be more like Christ in all that we think and do and speak.

Throughout this past year, the table above has included ALL donations and offerings received whether they be designated or not. It has also included ALL dollars that leave the main checking account. As of December 31, the Christmas Special Offering has totaled \$18,829. As you can see, that is the surplus listed in the table above. A tithe of this offering will be donated to Turning Point in February when we have a final total. The remainder of the offering will be available for 2024 general use, providing a nice cash reserve which enables us to remain current with expenses.

It might be of interest to know that in 2023, \$405,880 was received as General Use offerings. The remaining donations and offerings were designated by the giver for specific purposes. Only the General Use funds can be used to cover our budgeted expenses which totaled \$405,202. Budgeted expenses were totally covered by General Use offerings received in 2023. The donations and offerings that were designated have to be used in accordance with the giver's wishes. These included things like mortgage reduction, memorials, special conference giving (UMCOR, Blanket Sunday, etc.), specific church expenses (plumbing repairs, new kitchen appliance, etc.), ministry team use, and various other designations.

Update on 2024 Pledges

As of mid-January, when this article was written, the church has received 87 pledged offerings for 2024 totaling \$325,968. The pledged offerings cover approximately 71% of the approved 2024 Budget of \$458,670. This is a higher percent coverage than last year. Congratulations!

The Finance Committee is grateful for every single dollar the church receives from the entire congregation – whether pledged or not. Asbury is blessed with a congregation who is committed to the work and witness that Asbury provides. We will continue to grow spiritually, care for our community, and provide a welcoming environment for all to worship.

Godly Play Class - PreK-Grade 5 - Lower Education Wing


