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Remember that story about Thomas? After the resurrection when Jesus showed up to the 10 disciples, but then Thomas was not there, and he was frustrated. What did he want? He wanted to see and touch the hands of Jesus. He wanted to see the power of transformation right in front of him. Thomas wanted to know the power in Jesus's hands.

Sometimes we lose sight that our hands are made in the image, and now likeness, of God's hands – specifically being like Jesus's hands. While we do not bear the scar of the crucifixion, it does not mean our hands lack the power of God's transformative work in this world. In fact we are called to be the hands and feet of Jesus through the Holy Spirit!

So, what does this mean as we live out our identity as the body of Christ -as the hands and feet of Jesus? It may mean different things for different people.

As we have discussed over these past months, the framework of the cross might help us consider this identity – this calling. How are we living out devotion – using our hands to hold the Bible to read it, to hold our hands together in prayer, to be intentional in journaling or fasting? How are we living out compassion – using our hands to provide for our neighbor, to share what we have, to offer our finances to the mission and ministry of the church? How are we living out worship – using our hands to share in communion and renewing our baptism, experiencing grace in communal song, prayer, and hearing of the Word? How are we living out justice—coming together to break the bond of errant systems, while building relationships with the least, the last, and the lost, and speaking on their behalf?

There is power in our hands through the Holy Spirit. The more we live into being one through Jesus Christ, the power increases – and not for our own edification, but for transformation – for beauty to break through the crust of despair, malaise, anger, and fear. There is power in our hands through the Holy Spirit to bring hope, help, and to help usher in the new thing God is always working within and around us.

Take a glance at your hands—what do you see? What have they been used for? What reminders are left? Where do you see the power of Jesus within them? Look deeper – it's there – waiting to be unleashed. How will you use these hands now?

Building communities and strengthening lives.




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THANKSGIVING IN A BAG: PIES! PIES! PIES!


Instead of our typical monthly Sandwich Sunday Lunch, this month we will be collaborating with other churches, coordinated by First Presbyterian, to provide a Thanksgiving meal for folks in our community, including White Sands.

Asbury UMC will be responsible for pulling together 40 pies of the 150 bags being created. This can happen in several ways:

- bake a pie (in a container that can stay with the family)
- purchase a pie and bring it in
- or donate \$10 towards a pie.

This fall, Asbury UMC, in cooperation with Sunday School, the church began the Trex recycling program. So far, the church has brought in 224.3 Pounds of Plastic! We have until February to reach our 500 pounds.

Once 500 pounds of plastic has been recorded, Trex will in turn create a bench to be sent to Asbury UMC, which in turn will be used or shared with the community. While this does not completely irradicate plastic, it repurposes it for decking and furniture, as well as bring awareness of how much bag plastic exists in our world.


As you can see from the information above, we are "spending" more than we are "receiving" in offerings. We have had unexpected maintenance items come up that had to be taken care of. Such as the repair of the church's fire detection system in the spring, that alone was just under \$12,500. This one repair is almost the amount of our current deficit as of the end of September. We have had other unplanned smaller expenses throughout the year and will likely still see a couple more before the year is done. We all know what one large unexpected expenditure can do to tight finances.

We have had to use most of our modest cash reserves to cover expenses throughout the year. Our cash reserve in our checking account is now very limited. A cash reserve helps us to remain current with expenses as they come due instead of possibly having to hold payments until enough deposits are made to cover the expenditure amounts.

The Finance Committee is therefore designating this year's Christmas Special Offering to the church operating budget to erase our current deficit and to help stabilize our financial position. But we also want to continue to be a good neighbor in our community. A tithe (10%) from the Christmas Special Offering will be donated to a local charitable organization. The Finance Committee is in the process of selecting an organization now. We will be able to announce the selection shortly. We ask that you prayerfully consider giving generously to the Christmas Special Offering this year.

Giving Thanks and Praise

It started out as a low murmur in the mid-morning. Slowly the sound increased, and I knew the fields surrounding the house were starting to be harvested. The two main crops in this area are corn and soybean, and the soybean was on the day's agenda. A breeze was picking up as I hurried to close the windows before the air became saturated with soybean dust. By midafternoon the harvesting continued and as I was sitting on the front porch one could easily see that the air was overwhelmed by gently floating particles. Just what the allergies needed. A day later the soybeans around us had been harvested and stored for the winter as I now wait for the harvesting of the corn, and once again the dust. I am quite sure the farmers are happy with their yield this year because the fields looked plentiful, and the farmers give thanks.

I too am pleased for the bounty of my small vegetable garden. As I peek in the pantry, I have the following: tomatoes, corn, green beans, potatoes, peaches, applesauce, various amounts of jam, tart cherries, blackberries, and the carrots and parsnips are waiting for the first frost which will become extra sweet before they are harvested. And just like the farmers, I too am happy with the yield this year, and I also give thanks.

And won't be long until we start to gather around a table filled with family, filled with friends, or filled with a combination of family and friends. And just like the farmers, just like my pantry, we gather around the table once the food is presented with delight in the feast that has been set before us and we give thanks.

Now, if you listen closely to the farmers, if you listen closely to me and to those gathered around the Thanksgiving table, I believe you will hear a familiar theme. I prepared the soil for planting, I planted the seeds, I weeded the crops, I watered when it was necessary, I harvested and I canned the food, I went to the store for stores to buy the food for Thanksgiving, I cleaned and I prepared the house, I cooked the food, I did the cleaning up, I did, I did, I did. Oh yes, let's not forget to say a prayer and thank God for all the good and good gifts of this year, but I really did all the work.

Do you see a problem with the above paragraph. As Children of God, we tend to boast and brag about all the things "I" have done, all the actions "I" do and then many times we tend to throw in a quick prayer somewhere thanking God, almost as an afterthought. Why even one of our Thanksgiving hymns reflect this sentiment: "We gather together to as the Lord's blessing". The action here is that "we" are doing the gathering, it is our doing.

So maybe as Children of God it is time to challenge ourselves and rearrange and refocus our thoughts in a new and different way. Maybe it is time to forgo the "I" and acknowledge that we truly aren't the ones in control. Maybe it is time to acknowledge that God is the action, that God is the "I" and we, well, we are the results. This is why the hymn **Gather Us In** by Marty Haugen is so poignant, and in my opinion should really be our new Thanksgiving hymn. We aren't doing the gathering, we aren't doing the action as portrayed in the hymn, **We Gather Together**, but rather in the hymn, **Gather Us In**, God is doing the gathering, God is bringing the harvest home and that harvest is us.

If you have ever walked along the beach, searching and gathering shells, beach glass and even small pebbles, I am sure you can relate to the following. You might pick up a shell and upon closer examination you realize that the shell is broken, or cracked, or the colors are kind of blah and you

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toss it aside since it isn't perfect. The same goes for beach glass. The glass might not be smooth enough, or the edges are still rough, or you have plenty of that color already in your collection, so you toss it back into the ocean. Now could you imagine if God acted that way towards us? Pick us up, examine us and toss us aside if we aren't perfect. But yet as we hear in the hymn God "Gathers us in, the lost and forsaken, gather us in the blind and the lame" and our response should be one of loud praise and thanksgiving. For whom among us is perfect? Who among us is totally whole? We need to be thankful that God is the gatherer and that God is the action who accepts us for who and what we are.

And since God is our gatherer, we can and should rejoice that God calls each one of us by our own name. Have you ever been in a busy place and suddenly hear your name. You stop what you are doing and search the crowd wondering if someone was calling you or someone else. Or when you arrive at a destination and the people waiting for you shout out and call your name. You automatically respond with a broad smile as you rush over to those gathered who are waiting for you with hugs. By God calling us by our name rather than "hey you" or "so and so", this shows that God knows each of us totally as a person, unique and individual, and not just a hodge podge of people. "Call to us now and we shall awaken, we shall arise at the sound our name".

And finally, as we sit around the table this Thanksgiving, celebrating the gifts that we have received of family, friends, loved ones, food, etc. this past year, let us pause and take the time to remind ourselves and reflect with a new understanding that it is God who is the action of all aspects in our lives. It is God who gathers us in even though we are broken, we are cracked and we are not polished people. God loves us as we are, a simple and yet complex statement. And with this love God, "Gathers us in and hold us forever, gathers us in and make us His own, gathers us in all people together, fire of love in our flesh and our bone."
