Now, I don't know how well you dance in real life. When I was young, that was my dream: to be a professional tap dancer. I would practice in my Easter shoes on our linoleum floor as often as I could. As soon as my parents picked up on the fact that dancing could be in my future, they enrolled me in dance class: ballet... Needless to say, I did not want to wear the tutu or the dance slippers – I wanted to make some noise! (Guess that hasn't changed much.)

What I did not realize at the time was that ballet provided a foundation that would take me to tap at some point. I could not see that practicing slowly would help my muscles learn rhythms and forms that would be used later when things would go faster. It required learning something new. It required failing, learning, and succeeding one step at a time. These strange forms did not seem to match my body or my passions, so it required practice.

Learning to dance with Jesus, I have come to understand, is quite similar. See, grace leads us to the dance of discipleship. According to Steve Manskar in his book *Opening Ourselves to Grace* states, "cooperating with the Holy Spirit and sanctifying grace by habitually practicing the means of grace does not come naturally... it is learned over time through discipline and practice with experienced practitioners. (p. 32)"

This is why it is important to keep dancing with Jesus and with one another. We need the routine, the muscle memory, the encouragement, the direction, and the challenge. Practicing daily our dance in grace may look like the Hokey Pokey to the world, but the truth is these dance steps are supposed to transform our lives into something the world doesn't recognize right away. Because our dance instructor if not of this world, our moves will be awkward, some even hard, but worth every turn.

Maybe it is the merengue of generosity, the foxtrot of forgiveness, the mambo of mercy, the salsa of study, the hip hop of hope, or the polka of gratitude. Each step we take we connect with our Lord and Savior. Yes, we can become sore if we sluff off in our practicing, but the beauty is – we keep being invited to dance. Get on those dance shoes! Let's be disciplined in living and loving this dance with Jesus. **Rev. Katie Osier**

TASTE AND SEE: LAY LEADER REFLECTION—PETER BAYLIS

If you are hungry, come and be fed. If you are thirsty come and drink. If you are in need, come and you will be satisfied. Come, and I will nourish your body where you can find peace and rest. Come, do not hesitate. Come.

Growing up I remember my mother and I going to the food pantry/clothing pantry every Thursday afternoon along with Miss Abigail Larrson to volunteer for the afternoon. Did I do this voluntarily; absolutely not. Not only did I drag my feet, but I am quite sure I went kicking and screaming the whole way. This volunteering happened for me every summer during vacation when I would rather be at the beach, a neighbor's pool swimming or just being out and about with my friends. Why did I have to sit and stand in a stuffy hot building helping people that I didn't even know?

When we arrived at the pantry, my mom would unlock the door and turn the sign over. The sign was not your usual sign which said, "Open" but rather the sign said, "Hospitality Found Within". I was always intrigued by that sign, "Hospitality Found Within" and it was Miss Larrson who reminded me on more than one occasion that hospitality is the foundation of life. I can still hear Miss Larrson saying to me, "Peter, hospitality is our blessed duty to welcome strangers and friends alike. And since we are fortunate enough to have food and shelter, we need to welcome each person into our homes, into our spaces, and into our lives the best that we can. Especially to those who aren't as fortunate as you and me." It was not until I was much older that I allowed her words to finally sink in. Another way to define what God's hospitality is, "an offer to identify with outsiders and to treat them like insiders. Hospitality, with God making a place for us in the world that God created, a world that we have no claim to inhabit."

Our Christian journey is a life of faith in that we are not asked to leave our bodies behind, but rather our life of faith and our pursuit of faithfulness is lived out in and through our bodies. We lift and raise our voices to praise God and we offer words of encouragement and hope; we move our hands and feet to fight for justice in the world as we offer hands of compassion and gentleness and when we truly open our eyes we see and behold the beauty of the Earth and all the creatures within.

In Matthew's Gospel we hear the story of Jesus feeding of the 5000 and just like so many centuries ago, Jesus continues to affirm the goodness of nourishing our bodies in our pursuit of being faithful as he feeds us today both in body and in spirit. For Jesus said to the disciples, "They need not go away; you give them something to eat." They replied, "We have nothing here but five loaves and two fish." And he said, "Bring them here to me." Then he ordered the crowds to sit down on the grass. Taking the five loaves and the two fish, he looked up to heaven and blessed and broke the loaves and gave them to the disciples, and the disciples gave them to the crowds. And all ate and were filled, and they took up what was left over of the broken pieces, twelve baskets full. And those who ate were about five thousand men, besides women and children." And for this nourishment of our bodies and spirit we give thanks.

The feeding of the 5000 does not only supply nourishment to those present, but it also helps to identify the significance of Jesus' actions involving the abundance and the lack of abundance of

food. First of all, the Roman Empire was marked by significant inequalities concerning food access. While the elite and those of power had an abundance of good quality food, most people struggled continually for adequate food and nutrition. Therefore, the lack of food was just one way most people experienced the injustice of power. Secondly, the biblical tradition identifies God's will that hungry people be fed. In the wilderness God provided manna for the people. In Ezekiel, we hear Ezekiel condemning the leaders of Israel for failing to feed the people and in Isaiah, God declares that people should share one's bread with the hungry. In the feeding of the 5000, we witness how Jesus takes control and hosts the meal. He blessed the food and gave it to the crowd. The language of "taking," "loaves," "blessed," "broke," "gave to the disciples", "ate", and "all", appear in during the last supper, however, this is not the last supper, but the two are linked using food and in the giving of divine blessing. And for this nourishment of body and spirit we give thanks.

When we celebrate communion in October, let us be mindful that this is also Worldwide Communion Sunday. This day we lift and open our eyes to see our oneness in Christ, the Prince of Peace. As we partake in the bread and juice, may we truly taste and truly see the depth of God's love not only for us, but for each person throughout creation. May we find the strength and the courage to look beyond the outer layer of ourselves and of others so that we can see and peer deep inside. And by opening ourselves up, may we be fed, may we be nourished and may we rejoice with wonderment of all the goodness of the Lord. And may this nourishment of our body and this nourishment of our spirit empower each of us to answer the call to go serve in the world, a world ever more in need of peacemaking.


SUNDAY SCHOOL CLASSES: 9:30 AM, SUNDAYS


MINISTRY OPPORTUNITY: NURSERY AND CHILDREN'S CORNER
